Restoring Vision in Sri Lanka

Your support made it possible not only to carry out 110 life-changing cataract surgeries, but to restore dignity, independence, and hope to people who had been living in darkness. Thanks to your compassion and commitment, elderly mothers can once again see their grandchildren, breadwinners have returned to work, and lives have been renewed in ways that words can hardly express. This project has been a powerful reminder that sight is more than just vision—it is freedom, opportunity, and connection. As a charity, The Dust Project was privileged to partner with the Paalam Project to bring this initiative to life through collaboration with several key organisations. One of the most significant partnerships was with the Rotary Club of PanColombo, whose

members offered vital support throughout the surgical process and follow-up care. This included the provision of essential aftercare and glasses for patients in need. Among their members, optometrist Chanaka Weerasandara played a



pivotal role, drawing on his professional network to introduce us to the Lions Golden Jubilee Eye Hospital in Kadawatha. The hospital's chairperson, Mr. Mahesh Pasquel, was deeply moved by the vision to serve individuals from low socio-economic backgrounds and generously offered to carry out the surgeries at cost price. This remarkable gesture



allowed the £10,000 funding — which we had anticipated would fund 80 surgeries — to stretch significantly further, ultimately covering 110 life-changing cataract operations.


Health Care for Asylum Seekers

Updates from Athens OneHeart Clinic/www.reachbeyond.org.uk

OneHeart clinic in Athens (under Reach Beyond UK) now employs a Greek doctor for five hours per week to treat asylum seekers and refugees. Manchester GP, Dr. Tom, volunteered for a week at the clinic in June 2025 and met Dr. Leonidas. He was impressed by the contribution and dedication of Dr. Leonidas. The provision of Legacy funding has improved health care for the Iranian, Afghan and Kurdish patients who come from the refugee camp on the outskirts.



For example, an Afghan came with a large lump in his leg. The story is that he was helping the British in Kabul and got hit in the leg by shrapnel. His body had reacted by growing a large painful area around the shrapnel. The dedicated team will arrange affordable surgery at a local hospital through their contacts.



- Pray about the application made by the charity to obtain a full Greek Medical licence for the clinic, so that they offer more services (including missionary volunteers).
- With rising energy costs, they want to become self-sufficient in energy by using solar power.
 They are near their funding target.


Another project that the Legacy Fund has supported is Mission Direct.






Work has started on the Kiine Nursery School classrooms. The builders are working on the foundations. Thank you Christ Church Ware.

LOCATION OF MISSION PARTNERS








