"I saw a large crowd of people working hard on a massive wooden structure. They gathered to pray but nothing happened, they went off again and made more pieces to add to it. This same sad scene went on for some time, but no matter how hard they worked, nothing happened. Soon, I began to hear a sound; it was distant at first, but it grew louder and louder. Then I saw it, a massive body of people – of every age and nationality – came running, dancing and shouting, shapeless like a flood.

I heard them say, 'He makes all things new!" as they smashed through the man-made structure, which fell with a great crash! Those who had been building responded in different ways. 1st Century: The Great Transformation

- <u>Timing:</u> Following the death of Jesus, the early Christian church emerged and rapidly took shape in a chaotic period within the Roman Empire.
- Cycle of change: The early church transitioned from a Jewish sect to a
 distinct religion. This period included major shifts in theology, worship
 practices, and social structures, culminating in the destruction of the
 Jewish Second Temple in 70 AD and the scattering of the Jews.
- <u>New structures:</u> Early Christian communities developed leadership structures and compiled the scriptures that would form the New Testament.

5th Century: The Fall of Rome

- <u>Timing:</u> Around 476 AD, with the collapse of the Western Roman Empire.
- <u>Cycle of change:</u> As the centralized Roman power disintegrated, the Roman Catholic Church and the papacy grew in power and became a dominant stabilizing force in the West. This era was crucial for the formation of Western Christendom, as the church took on a greater role in political and social life.
- <u>New structures:</u> The Church cemented its hierarchical structure and established its authority in the vacuum left by the fallen empire.

11th Century: The Great Schism

- <u>Timing:</u> Officially dated to 1054 AD.
- Cycle of change: The long-brewing theological, political, and cultural
 disputes between the Greek East and the Latin West culminated in a
 formal split, with each side excommunicating the other. Key
 disagreements included papal authority and the addition of
 the filioque clause to the Nicene Creed.
- New structures: Western and Eastern Christianity permanently separated into the Roman Catholic Church and the Eastern Orthodox Church.





16th Century: The Protestant Reformation

- <u>Timing:</u> Beginning in 1517 with Martin Luther's Ninety-five Theses.
- Cycle of change: Martin Luther's protest against the Catholic Church's sale of indulgences ignited a continent-wide movement. Aided by the printing press, reformers like Luther and John Calvin challenged papal authority and traditional church doctrines.
- New structures: The result was the splintering of Western Christianity and the creation of numerous new Protestant denominations, including Lutheranism, Calvinism, and Anglicanism.

21st Century: The Great Emergence (Ongoing)

- <u>Timing:</u> The current era, according to Tickle and other observers, is another period of great spiritual transition.
- Cycle of change: This cycle is characterized by the decline of traditional denominations, the rise of "spiritual but not religious" populations, and the proliferation of smaller, independent church communities. The digital age provides a new means for spiritual ideas to spread, much like the printing press did for earlier reformers.
- <u>New structures:</u> The shift is happening away from rigid institutional loyalty toward more fluid, individualized, and digitally connected forms of worship and community.

The Quiet Revival

The Quiet Revival





'Quiet Revival' refers to a significant, yet subtle, increase in church attendance and spiritual engagement. The move of God is particularly notable among younger demographics like Generation Z and includes growth in diverse groups and denominations, such as Catholicism and Pentecostalism. This revival is characterized by a growing spiritual openness and curiosity, contrasting with past trends of secularization.

Key Aspects of the Quiet Revival

- <u>Increased Attendance</u>: Data from the Bible Society's surveys shows a rise in regular church attendance from 8% in 2018 to 12% in 2024, with a dramatic increase among young adults under 35, from 4% to 16%.
- <u>Demographic Shift:</u> The church is becoming more diverse, with a growing representation from ethnic minorities.
- <u>Spiritual Engagement: There</u> is an observable increase in spiritual openness, with individuals showing curiosity about faith, interested in learning about the Bible, and more likely to pray.
- <u>Generational Impact:</u> Young people, particularly Generation Z, are demonstrating increased engagement with Christianity.
- <u>Denominational Growth:</u> Various Christian traditions, including Catholicism and Pentecostal churches, are experiencing growth.

Causes and Context

- Reaction to Secularism: Some view the Quiet Revival as a response to the unsatisfying and sometimes hopeless nature of the secular online world, with people seeking deeper meaning.
- <u>Focus on Discipleship:</u> Rather than just growth in numbers, there is a call for deep spiritual maturity and discipleship, emphasizing repeated encounters with Scripture, prayer, community, and service.

Significance

• Relevance of Christianity: The trend indicates that Christianity remains relevant to many people, especially the younger generation.





- <u>Missional Opportunity:</u> The Quiet Revival is seen as a "holy opportunity" for the church to guide searching individuals and help them establish deep roots in their faith.
- <u>Positive Societal Impact:</u> Research indicates that churchgoers tend to report higher life satisfaction, are more likely to volunteer, and donate to charity.
